Dear Friends,

My Dad was one of 13 children; my Mom was one of 10. We attended church every Sunday. As a young child growing up in a small Baptist church in a farming community, my parents always gave me money, usually 50 cents or a dollar, to place in the offering plate during Sunday service when they placed theirs in the offering plate. Even at a young age, I felt as though I was making a BIG contribution to my church.

I was also taught at a young age that service in church was a Christian's responsibility to give back. My Mom modeled service by teaching Sunday School classes, leading WMU (Women's Missionary Union), responding to needs in the community, and visiting the sick and elderly. My Dad was a deacon, helped with building repairs and physically moving new ministers. As a farmer, he was the manager of the farms (that God had blessed him with) and our environment where we lived. He was the caretaker of the fish in the pond, cattle in the pastures, the streams that flowed around the farms, and soil that needed to be amended to make it fertile to produce food, not only for family, but beyond. They each supported our church and the community. They were very aware of the God-given blessings; I was not always aware of those blessings.

I now know that those early years have greatly influenced my Christian journey so much. Each day, I realize that anything I give to the church is only a small part of the continual blessings that I receive each day from God. He entrusts us with gifts while we are here on earth that are ours to manage wisely—money, talents, skills, or spiritual gifts. It is my responsibility to invest my gifts wisely to honor God and his work in my church and my community.

"God's foremost rule of finance is this: We own nothing. We are managers, not owners. Stewards, not landlords. Maintenance people, not proprietors. Our money is not ours; it is His." (Max Lucado)

I'd like to share an excerpt from a letter I received a few years ago, after we returned from a Honduras mission trip.

"The last four years have truly changed my life, and I prayed that our team could make a real difference this year. I prayed that God would help us to change the lives of those people for the better. When you and I were walking back to the village down that rocky rut-filled road from doing the last job, I was praying to myself that I hoped we had done something special and that God was pleased with our work. At that very instant, from out of nowhere, a little boy quietly slipped up beside me and reached out and grabbed my hand. I was startled for a moment because it caught me off guard. He was about the age of my son. He didn't say a word. He just looked up at me and smiled. I just about lost it and broke down right there on that road back to the bus. I will never forget that moment for the rest of my life. God answered me through that child. All the bumpy roads, nausea, and bad jokes were so worth that one smile and those big brown eyes filled with joy. I know we made a difference!"
