Once I said yes to working with The Kenya Project, my life and the life of my family changed. God has given David and me the opportunity to serve in Kenya and see the building of Mountain Park Academy from the ground up. Mama Robi was given the vision by God to build a school in the tribal war-torn country of Kenya. She knew that the change within that community could only come through the education of its children. Through the first \$1200.00 donation from Mountain Park UMC, the first mission team from this church laid the foundation of the first school. There is now a lower school (grades pre K to 8 th grade) and the secondary school (high school) 9 th through 12 th which was the original school. A trade school was completed in 2019. A well for clean water was dug for the school and the surrounding community. There are now 4 children's homes for orphans, a chicken project to serve one to 2 eggs per week for protein, and a cow project for milk for their daily morning gruel. We have seen children graduate from high school and complete college or a trade school. Some students have children of their own now. The people of this community are our second family. God has been so faithful not only to us but the people of this community.

When we joined this church, we faithfully promised to participate in its ministries through our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our services so that God would be glorified through Jesus Christ. You are blessed ten thousand times by saying yes when God calls you to serve in any way. Prayerfully examine your financial gifts to God and see what God can do with it.

Dear Friends,

Back in 2019, I was recovering from several traumatic losses. My best friend died suddenly on her way home from a church mission trip. I fell on a work trip and fractured my elbow. Around the same time, my family suffered death and loss as well. I was weary, worn, and sad. I was hanging out with Job. One day I looked up at my wall and saw with new eyes a small plaque that had been given to me by the women of a local church during a retreat. It reads: "Remember who you wanted to be." YES, I felt in my bones, seeing it as if for the first time. How, I wondered, how will I do this? Suddenly I remembered the excited voice of a friend who went to the public media forum, Moth Story Hour and told her true story.

Later that same week, without telling anyone, I signed up to tell a story at the Moth Story Hour held in a warehouse in downtown Houston, the largest venue of its type in the country. It was a new and scary context for me. After a lifetime of public speaking, I was surprisingly terrified but anchored as I told a true story that mattered to me and might to others. Unbeknownst to me some church friends were in the crowd. They celebrated my courage, told me how it impacted their own journey, and sent me pictures they took that still travel with me to remind me of how my voice shook as I told my story of grief and hope.

Sometimes in life, it feels like we as a church and a culture are back where I was in 2019. Grieving, weary, aching, frightened: asking for the way forward to new life rooted in abundance that flows from the heart of God.

The practice of inviting a church community to tell our story is life-giving as part of cultivating a culture of generosity. It is a way to follow as disciples of Jesus whose life and ministry center around telling stories. I hope that in this Stewardship season you are excited to open your hearts to generosity by telling the true story of how, who, what, where, and why God has called resurrection life into being in you, in our ministry, and in our church.

Dear Friends,

These are the most recent stats from Nonprofitssource.com, Christianity Today, Giving USA, Philanthropy Daily, etc.

- In America, 17% of families reduced the total annual amount they give to their local church.
- 17% of Americans tithe on a regular basis.
- Christians in the United States offer an average church giving of 2.5% of their net income. In comparison, during the Great Depression, Christians gave 3.3%.
- Of those who tithe regularly, 77% give 11% to 20% (or sometimes even more!) of their income.
- 37% of regular church attendees don't give money to church.
- Average giving by adults at US Protestant churches is about \$17 a week (<u>Health Research Funding</u>)
- Regular attendees give \$1,737 more per year than those who attend less than once a month (<u>Philanthropy Daily</u>) However, studies suggest that attendance frequency correlates with higher giving. Those who regularly attend services give an average of \$1,737 more per year than those who attend less than once a month.
- Churches in the US received 27% of all donations in 2021, down from 56% in 1980, 70% in 1954.

Scripture: For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision counts for anything; the only thing that counts is faith working through love. (Galatians 5:6- John Wesley's favorite Bible verse)

Dear Friends,

Here are some facts about the United Methodist Church. These facts help remind us where we came from.

1. John Wesley wrote one of the all-time bestselling medical texts.

Wesley was deeply convicted that God is concerned about our earthly life as well as our heavenly one. To that end, he wrote a medical text for the everyday person titled Primitive Physick. Many of Wesley's tips on healthy living remain widely accepted, including, "drink lots of water" and "eat your biggest meal in the morning."

2. John Wesley coined the term "agree to disagree."

Over the years, Wesley had serious theological differences with another popular pastor named George Whitefield. Though they both argued passionately, Wesley reflected on these differences in a memorial sermon for Whitefield by saying: "There are many doctrines of a less essential nature. ... In these, we may think and let think; we may 'agree to disagree.'"

3. John Wesley rode far enough on horseback to circle the earth 10 times.

Wesley rode 250,000 miles on horseback! He was convinced that it was important for him personally to spread the gospel through relationships and continue to grow closer to God in those relationships.

4. Wesley taught that doubt was part of faith.

Wesley believed that having questions about one's faith should not be disparaged. Doubts are essential to making any belief system one's own. Having questions does not mean that you don't believe.

5. "Methodist" was originally a derogatory term.

Though the origins of the term "Methodist" are in dispute, but it is clear that it was originally used by outsiders to mock John Wesley and his early societies because of their dedication to following a "method" for growing closer to God. Wesley ended up accepting the term, considering it a positive descriptor of their movement.

Pray for 43,409 UMC churches and 13 million United Methodists in the world.

Scripture: Yet I am writing you a new commandment that is true in him and in you, because the darkness is passing away and the true light is already shining. Whoever says, "I am in the light," while hating a brother or sister, is still in the darkness. Whoever loves a brother or sister abides in the light, and in such a person there is no cause for stumbling. But whoever hates a brother or sister is in the darkness, walks in the darkness, and does not know the way to go, because the darkness has brought on blindness. (1 John 2:8-11- from John Wesley's favorite book in the Bible)

Dear Friends,

Here are more facts about the United Methodist Church. These facts help remind us who we are and where we came from.

6. Wesley counseled people to "eat a little less than you desire."

Staying slim was far from Wesley's goal, though he did weigh in around 128 pounds. This was not the result of dieting, but rather of a practice to ensure that people were not ruled by their natural desires, but exercising control over them.

7. Wesley never intended to split from the Church of England.

However, when the revolution happened in the American colonies, most of the Anglican priests returned home. Faced with the fact that none of the Methodists in the colonies could receive the sacraments, Wesley ordained ministers whom he sent to do the same in America. That act was the beginning of the separation that formed the Methodist Church in America.

8. Wesley taught you could not be a Christian on your own.

He said that we needed to be involved in "social holiness." Though some often think this term is synonymous with "social justice," its meaning is quite different. Wesley believed we could only grow as Christians in community.

9. Methodism grew from four to 132,000 members in Wesley's lifetime.

The beginning of Methodism was a group of four who called themselves the "holy club" at Oxford. When Wesley died in 1791, he left behind a movement with 72,000 members in the British Isles and 60,000 in America.

Trivia(But Not So Trivial): Did you know that the United Methodist Church (UMCOR) was the first nongovernmental organization to go to Ground Zero after the September 11 attack? The United Methodist Church donated over \$20 million dollars toward the cause through our UMCOR Offering.
